

I love the Christmas hymn, "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear," even though it

never mentions Jesus by name. It's a beautiful song that talks about both the glory of the angels singing "Peace on earth, good will to all, from heaven's all gracious king," and it also talks about "You, beneath life's crushing load, whose forms are bending low." The reality of Christmas is both of those things—joy and pain, peace and despair. We would so much like to breeze through the holidays with no anxiety, no stress, no strain—but that doesn't often happen.

I wonder if we think we have to have a "perfect" Christmas with "perfect" gifts, "perfect" meals, "perfect" decorations, etc., etc., etc. I know I put a lot of time into decorating, shopping, wrapping, and planning for what I hope will be a wonderful Christmas celebration. It took me awhile to let go of the idea that everything had to be "perfect," because of course, it never is and it doesn't need to be.

Financial Update

The financial statements shown in the Door Post are the combined General Fund and Building Fund. At the end of November, the combined funds show a positive balance of \$1,653.00. That surplus needs explanation. The Building Fund has a surplus for the year of \$8,563.60 while the General Fund has a deficit of \$6,909.80.

As of the end of October, even with a Christmas offering, it appears based on bills still to be paid that the General Fund will be about approximately \$4,000 short at the end of the year. The Church Council decided not to send a letter and make a large appeal for additional funds, but it is asking that you consider adding an additional \$25 to \$50 to your December or Christmas offering.

Lutefisk

Lutefisk as a Christmas season meal has gained attention in Norway over the past 20 years.^{[13][14][15]} The Norwegian Seafood Export Council indicated sales of lutefisk to restaurants and catering companies in Norway increased by 72% between 2005 and 2008.^[13] A 2005 survey found 20% of Norwegians ate lutefisk during the <u>Christmas holiday season</u>, although only 3% would consider it for their Christmas dinner.^[16]

<u>Madison, Minnesota</u> has dubbed itself the "lutefisk capital of the world" as well as claiming the largest per capita consumption of lutefisk in Minnesota.^{[3][17]} <u>St. Olaf College</u> in Northfield, Minnesota serves lutefisk during their Christmas Festival concerts. They also host an annual music festival called "Lutefest". Lutefisk, though, is not served at this festival.^[18]

Many Lutheran churches across Wisconsin also serve Lutefisk dinners as a yearly tradition. Four popular churches are St. Olaf Lutheran Church in Dodge County, Christ Lutheran Church in DeForest, Orfordville Lutheran Church in Rock County and Northland Lutheran Church in Iola.

Lutefisk is also consumed in Canada because of its relatively large <u>Scandinavian population</u>, particularly in the traditionally agricultural, inland provinces of Western Canada. As of 2016, there are about 463,000 Norwegian Canadians, 350,000 Swedish Canadians, 207,000 Danish Canadians and 143,000 Finnish Canadians.^[19] Organizations such as the <u>Sons of Norway</u> hold annual lutefisk dinners. Lutefisk is sometimes available in specialty stores^[20] and supermarkets where there are large Scandinavian populations. <u>Kingman</u>, <u>Alberta</u> proclaims itself on its greeting sign to be the "Lutefisk capital of Alberta".
